



**Epiphany**, traditionally remembered on January 6<sup>th</sup>, is a celebration of the coming of the Magi, or **Wise men**, in the Nativity narrative.

We are just as familiar with the story of the shepherds who rushed to the stable following the dramatic announcement by the angels. Shepherds, who did an important job but weren't thought much of and were poor.

The shepherds couldn't keep quiet about this meeting with Jesus and the wise men offered him gifts. Will we tell others with excitement about our faith? What gifts could we give?

What can I give Him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; If I were a Wise Man, I would do my part; Yet what I can I give Him: give my heart.
